Virtual Discernment Retreat: March 12-14, 2021

The Lenten season is a good time to reflect on how God is calling you. So, we invite you to join us for a virtual Discernment retreat, "Following God Joyfully," which will be held March 12-14, 2021. You will have opportunities for fun and to laugh together through social times and games. A sister companion will walk with you during this retreat and offer spiritual guidance.

Presentations will include a theological reflection on following Jesus, getting to know who the Dominican Sisters of Peace are, and listening to Sisters' sharing stories of their lives and mission life in these times.

In a world where you can be anything . . . Be Peace, Build Peace, Preach Peace

During the weekend of January 8 - 10, 2021, the Vocations team welcomed seven discerning women to a Virtual Mission For Peace program.

The program centered around sharing how we live our Charism as Dominican Sisters and Associates of Peace. It was an uplifting experience of community, prayer, exploration, laughter, discussion, action, and transformation.

We began Friday evening by praying with the words of our founder St. Dominic and then explored how we share the love of Christ with others in all that we do and are.

On Saturday morning, Sr. Bea wove prayers for Peace with quotations from Pope Francis' Encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*. Then, Sr. Francine Schwarzenberger shared how we are called to **Be**Peace and how she lives this. She invited us to reflect on two questions, What does peace look

like? and Who exemplifies being peace? We also reflected on quotations from John Lewis and Edwina Gaetley.

Sr. Marguerite Chandler shared how she lives **Build Peace** through her ministry at <u>Shepherd's Corner Ecology Center</u>. Afterwards, the women were invited to go outside and connect with the natural world while reflecting on the Encyclical, <u>Laudato Si</u>. They were also encouraged to calculate their carbon footprint and to explore some of our Ecojustice resources on <u>Going Green</u>.

We also had small breakout groups on how our Sisters & Associates are involved in working to eradicate human trafficking and to promote social justice.

In the evening, we shared the fruits of our contemplation and then joined together in Taizé style evening prayer.

The day was capped off with a social hosted by our Sisters in formation. Rumor has it, that the conversations went well into the night.

Sunday morning began with us attending Mass together via Zoom. This was accomplished by weaving parts of a previously recorded Mass with live readings done by the discerners, psalms sung by Sisters and a time of faith sharing facilitated by Sr. Jeanne Moore. Although we were physically scattered across the United States, there was a felt sense of communion among us all.

After Mass, Sr. Jeanne invited a panel of our Sisters (Sr. Cathy Hilkert, Sr. Robin Richard, and Sr. Esther Calderon) to share how they **Preach Peace** in their lives and ministries.

At the end of the program, the discerning women shared some of the fruits of their reflection, which included a variety of creations, including some drawings and a poem. Shared below is a poem and drawing from two of our discerning women.

Lord, show me what I can do, thank you for the gift of disputatio


I do not have it in me to lose hope, for I truly believe nothing is impossible for you, God.
