Monday through Friday, Kayla comes to the Peace Center for the After School Program. She joins other students from the neighborhood for snacks, to finish homework or to study for tests, and to share free time to play on computers, with board games, or outside if the weather is good. Kayla says she enjoys coming to the Center because she knows she will get help with her homework if she needs it. She also enjoys helping the younger students with their homework, too.

At one point she told us she wanted to be a teacher, but she learned recently that teachers do not make very much money. She knows that people who are teachers care a lot about their students and want to give them hope for their futures so they can get jobs. But now, instead of teaching, she hopes to go into banking.

After School Program Volunteer

Larry Tierney, known as Mr. Larry by the kids at the Peace Center, is a faithful volunteer for the After School Homework Assistance Program. He has been coming to the Center daily for over a year, and in that time, kids have truly come to love and respect him. Neighborhood Networking



Gloria's Restaurant has been on the corner of Broadway and Colapissa, Gert Town for a very long time. Miss Gloria died in 2013, and the restaurant was left to her children. Today, her son **Korey Fernandez** handles the day-to-day running of the business.

Famous for its \$2 breakfast of eggs, breakfast meat, grits and a biscuit, the restaurant serves folks seven days a week from 6:30am to 7:00pm. There are always people coming in and out, talking about life and hard times, or having some laughs about life and hard times. Korey and his fellow cook, Bob Hogan, serve up some mighty fine food at a reasonable price.

Korey remembers how his mother tried to give back to the neighborhood when she was alive, and he wants to be able to do that again. Korey began working with Paul Bonitatibus, one of our Peace Center Advisory Council members with strong professional connections in the New Orleans area.

Paul connected Korey with the Urban League, where he was able to take courses for small businesses and create a business plan. Korey shared his plan with Councilwoman LaToya Cantrell to make his hopes and goal are more public. The downturn in the economy means that some ideas for big changes have to be put on hold, but in the meantime, small efforts have been made. Walls and floors have been scrubbed down; a new, more open counter space has been created.

Korey hopes to repair the outside of the restaurant, which is still damaged from Katrina. He is also planning to have a new sign painted on the door, and, once street repairs are completed, to create more parking in front of the restaurant.
