

### **Dominicans and the Rosary**

It is believed that the form of the rosary we use today was promoted by our Holy Father St. Dominic and our early Dominican itinerant preachers. It is said that when one Friar preached, the other prayed the Rosary to ask for the intercession of Our Blessed Mother and God.

However, the use of beads in prayer is much older than he, and not only a Christian ritual. The Buddhists, for example, use a string that is similar of 108 beads called a Mala on which they recite mantras.

To a Dominican, however, the rosary is truly a form of contemplative prayer, which calls to mind and heart the very realities of the life of our Christ -- from Mother Mary's Fiat in the Joyful Mysteries, to the Ascension of the Lord in the Glorious Mysteries of the Rosary, tell the story of all which was accomplished by the Savior for our salvation. Tradition tells us that Mary made various promises to all who recite the rosary. Many graces shall be theirs in life, and at death, and they shall participate in the merits of the Saints in paradise.
